The course addresses issues such as: Intangible heritage and artistic practices in the rural world and their role as activation elements of landscapes in decline; Cultural landscapes and minor villages, ancient sites and rural domestic: coincidence and opportunity; Built heritage, cartographies of memory; Architectural interventions, keys for the recovery of memory as a hallmark of the new interventions in the rural nuclei of the mountain areas. The course includes on site visits to cases of success in the area of aragonese Pyrenees.
